

We are out of our comfort zone but have the safety of anonymity," people's baggage read anxieties and tantrums. Also, travelling solo does not also always mean being alone with no social life. You can forge newer relationships with no expectations of maintaining it.
- 5. All said, travelling solo can be a bit daunting and not everyone's cup of tea therefore, start small. Do not make lofty plans. A short trip to a nearby beach destination or hill station can work wonders and boost your confidence. Keeping in mind why you wanted to travel solo can also be of great help. For some it would be to break away from the monotony of the daily life, for some it would be about unbridled freedom, for others it could be self-discovery.
- Nonetheless, it definitely adds to your confidence to manage things and yourself alone, because at times
 the best company you can have is yourself.
- 7. Stay patient if you want to start enjoying solo travel. Trust the process, it will get easier and no sooner than later it will be the most enjoyable form of travel.



These concerns must be addressed with a positive, broader, and responsible outlook. Digital, moral and self-responsibility is the need of the hour not only by the vlogger but also by the consumer.
